

## Hundreds of illegal vapes seized in Suffolk

Suffolk Trading Standards has stopped the sale of dangerous vapes. When used properly, vapes and e-cigarettes can be successful to help people to stop smoking. But criminals are selling illegal vapes, which can contain high levels of nicotine, contaminants, or banned ingredients such as taurine or caffeine. Some retailers sell vapes to children, enticed by the colourful packaging and sweet flavours. Legal vapes have: a tank of of 2ml, and the largest refill bottle is 10ml or under; be in childproof bottles displaying nicotine warnings and a safety leaflet. the nicotine strength should be no more than 20mg/ml or 2% and a maximum number 600 puffs. Any suspected illegal practises can be reported confidence to Suffolk Trading Standards via the Citizens Advice Consumer helpline on 0808 223 1133.

# New highways services arriving in Suffolk

Milestone Infrastructure, has been awarded Suffolk's new multi-million pound highways services contract for up to 20 years. MID SUFFOLK DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT THE PARISH COUNCIL 9TH MARCH 2023 Council tax freeze plus £2m for energy saving measures. Mid Suffolk District Council has confirmed a council tax freeze for residents and ring-fenced £2m for household energy-saving measures for those most in need.

Plans for Skills and Innovation Centre at Gateway 14 unveiled. Local businesses, students and workers could benefit from modern, collaborative working and learning spaces at Gateway 14. This seeks to create a unique space - blurring the boundaries between education and the world of work with workspaces, meeting/training rooms and collaboration spaces.

New £12m depot would 'future-proof' services for residents. The Councils are exploring plans to consolidate three aging operational sites into a shared £12m depot – future-proofing services for residents and improving staff conditions. New service aims to turn more than 1,000 empty houses into homes. Over a thousand homes across the districts are currently classified as empty, 'Houses4Homes' encourages owners of vacant residential properties to get advice and support in turning their property into a home for another family.

# DISTRICT COUNCIL ELECTIONS MAY 5TH 2023 DON'T GET CAUGHT OUT AND LOSE YOUR VOTE

Many people do not realise you now need to have photo identification to vote - the image must look like you and have your current name on it.

Alternatively get a postal vote or an Authority to Vote Certificate

On 28 April 2022, the Elections Act 2022 was passed bringing major changes to the way elections are run. It presents a danger that many people will be disenfranchised if they do not have the right identification

**Postal votes can be applied for up till April 18th**. You can take your postal vote to the polling station if you don't want to post it.

A Voter Authority Certificate You can apply up till 25th April can be used in all other elections and is valid for 10 years https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

or by calling 0300 123 4000 and then select option 7.

# CREETING ST. MARY HAS ITS DARK SIDE

We who live in Creeting St Mary are lucky...

but there is a Dark Side to our village at least there is at the moment...

When you are out at night, if you have a chance, look up. Because of our wonderful dark skies, you can enjoy a view many can no longer see. Stars, planets and our own milky way all visible, even Including a few weeks ago the Northern lights! These sights are there to be enjoyed and maybe inspire some into looking more intently. There is a whole universe to see!



But like for Jedi knights, there are forces gathering against the dark side. Many of us have outside lights, for security or ornament. I for one, would not want to be without them on a winters night as we return home. The issue facing the dark side is lights that are either badly setup and aligned, or not fitted to a sensor, or aimed upwards, casting their glow skyward. Looking around the village after dark it is easy to find security lights that illuminate half the street and cast their glow on houses all around. Another fact is that most security lights bought are vastly overpowered for the task in hand. 500W sounds impressive but is enough for even the largest garden and then some. Changing the bulb to a 250W or 125W one could reduce your electricity use by 50 - 75% and lower the amount of light escaping into our glorious star filled views. LED lights with less power and more accurately set up on a timer or motion sensor will save money, the less time it is on the less it costs to run. Aiming your lights down correctly where you want lit up also has advantages. You get better light where you want it! And, as a happy coincidence the dark side is less troubled by this and is not awakened.

# So a plea from the dark side: choose your lights carefully.

- Please set he light into the area you need it to.
- Change your bulbs if you can and save money.
- Set up your motion sensors or timers so when the village is sleeping and Dark Worshippers are out trying to look at or photograph the incredible sights above they spend less time moaning and more time enjoying the sights.

Lastly the biggest plea of all. Please join the dark side and look up in wonder and enjoy the spectacle above you.

I have long championed the need for brownfield development to be prioritised ahead of building on our precious Suffolk countryside and for planning decisions about new housing developments to be taken with our local communities at their heart.

Because of my belief in protecting the countryside from over-development that a few years ago, I worked with other MPs to block suggested changes to the planning system. These would have reintroduced a form of regionally set housing targets by the back door, as well as fast-tracked developments without proper local consultation or scrutiny. These changes were wrong and I am pleased to have played my part in stopping them.

However, the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill going through Parliament is different. The Government has listened to my views and is now set to reform the planning framework that will benefit local communities here in Suffolk. This will see a new development plan system at a local level, so plans decided by local communities will be given much higher priority, with a presumption that the local plan must be followed unless there is a very strong reason to override it. This is a significant step given the amount of work done by local communities to inform local plans. There is also a "use it or lose it" clause which will prevent developers from stockpiling land and gaming the system. Developers will lose their planning consent unless they proceed to develop the site in a timely manner.

Suffolk's towns and parishes already have the power to develop their own neighbourhood plans. Thanks to these important reforms, top-down regional housing targets will be a thing of the past, and Whitehall civil servants, will lose the power to impose massive new housing developments on our area. These reforms allow Parish Councils to produce simpler neighbourhood priorities statements', welcome news to our hardworking Parish Councils. Whilst I welcome these reforms, Icontinue to fight for new laws to allow a community right of appeal against a planning decision. Currently developers have the right to appeal but communities do not. Bad planning decisions need to be challenged, and residents deserve the right to do so. Finally, under the proposed reforms, new Local Plan Commissioners will be introduced to support or, if councils fail in their statutory duties, to take over plan-making, in tandem with a new set of measures to increase the effectiveness of planning enforcement.

I shall continue to do all that I can as an MP to ensure our local councils have better tools to make the right planning decisions in the future.

# Rev. Philip Payne **Fit to Serve**

As January gave way to February, the sun shone and we had some glorious days. It was an ideal opportunity for enjoying a country walk or two. Buoyed by that pleasure, I had started to write something upbeat for this From the Rectory. Then came the news from Turkey and northern Syria and suddenly my mood changed. For three years it feels as if crises have come tumbling in, like the waves of a storm lashing the shore-line. As one ebbs and tranquility looks restored, so the next wave breaks. Then, even when, as in Turkey or Pakistan for example, I have no direct involvement, still the pain affects me. As a poet once wrote, no man is an island, we are all part of a whole and the loss of any part diminishes us all.

Faced with news of more suffering on such a scale, we feel guilty talking of our own pleasures. Yet one thing the pandemic highlighted is the value of self-care. It is important that we look after our welfare; body, mind and spirit. One way to do so is through enjoying nature. That country walk on a sunny day is valuable. Hearing of a walk you enjoyed encourages me to get out and enjoy one too. Then you have helped boost my wellbeing.

From pandemic to poverty, earthquake to warfare; we may feel frustratingly impotent in the face of major crises. However, when we focus on what we can give, rather than what we can't, there is often something we can contribute. Every little helps but whatever form our service takes, we help best when we are fit to serve.

For many of us, a walk in the country, especially on a sunny day, feeds body, mind and spirit. With that in mind, let me return to my walk. The winter sun brightened a near cloudless sky. Melting frost dripped from branches warmed by the sun: the only sound was the crunch of my feet on the gravel as I strode along the track, ...... I'll say no more. Instead, I leave it to vou to fill in whatever makes for your peace, feeds your well-being, keeps you fit to serve.

# **Footpaths and Bridleways**

If you're a regular user, perhaps an occasional user or perhaps a non-user, of what are known as footpaths and bridleways, do you know what the difference is between the two?

Both are defined by the Government as Public Rights of Way, the main point being that you are allowed to walk on all public rights of way. In addition, public rights of way are also open to horse riders, cyclists or motorists, depending on their definition.

### You can use:

- footpaths for walking, running, mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs
- bridleways for walking, horse riding, bicycles, mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs
- restricted byways transport without a motor and powered mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs
- byways open to all traffic for any kind of transport, including cars (but they're mainly used by walkers, cyclists and horse riders)


  NOTE legislation regarding mobility-scooters is being debated in government.

  Creeting St Mary Parish has a mixture. Large maps showing their locations and which they are can be seen on the notice board outside the Village Hall, on the grass triangle beside Hawks Mill Bridge and in the old telephone kiosk in Jack's Green Road.

One particular footpath in the parish has recently received some improvements, FP7 which runs across the field opposite Woolney Hall in Low Road, up the hill to All Saints Road adjacent to Lindale Lodge. At the bottom end the steep gradient into the fields has been made a bit easier to climb by the recent installation of a stout wooden hand-rail which has been made it somewhat easier to climb up to the field. Near the top of the path, the old timber foot-bridge across the ditch has been replaced by a new wooden bridge. All-in-all, a much better route to walk.

# A BIT OF HISTORY

I was reading an article recently in "Suffolk Roots", the journal of the Suffolk Family History Society, when an item in the article caught my eye. The article writer had found a vicar in his family in Bury St Edmunds in 1742. He then queried whether there may be more "men of the cloth" in his family. Sure enough, his research in the Cambridge University records found a Rev Thomas Wynne (1713-1775) who was born in Combs but who was also Rector of Creeting All Saints and St Olaves from 1742 to 1775. Incidentally, it is also recorded that he also married Sarah Pitches in 1742 – perhaps they took up residence in the Creetings that year too.

This does seem a little odd to me because it is recorded that in 1735, a visitor to St Olave's site recorded "Church down. Hath been long down" (see "The Lost Church Of Creeting" web site). If that was the case, would the Rev Wynne still be known as the Rector of both churches although one had apparently collapsed and therefore become redundant? Or in those days, did a redundant/collapsed church still retain some tie to its neighbour? Indeed, was St Olaves actually non-functioning or did it possibly have a breath of life in it to allow people to worship and pray? Please let me know the answer if you know.

# CREETING NATURE NOTES helping nature to help us LILLEY'S WOOD

Our Lilley's Wood winter working parties have done sterling work to remove scrub and brambles from three areas of grassland so rare plants can flourish in this low-fertility soil. Adam Clint's tree surgeons have cut down a non-native Italian Alder which has been spreading invasive seedlings and have also laid over 100 metres of hedge. This will shoot from the laid growth making a much denser hedge, excellent for wildlife.

Tree wardens champion trees and hedgerows - iimportant to help tackle climate change and loss of biodiversity, providing 'corridors' for wildlife. Suffolk has only 8% tree cover (London - 20%); STWN rhelp with Community Tree Nurseries and offers tree hedgerow packs free if charge. 30,000 trees have been planted in the last 4 years. With the support of The Tree Council training is provided and events are organised.

Alder Carr Farm has been given several hundred trees and shrubs and have planted up 100m of hedge and gapped up others to make the thick growth needed by birds nesting to get away from predators.



My employer asked me to work some extra hours lately,

Mid Suffolk but I don't appear to have received the extra pay. I asked

my boss about it and they said they would look into it,

but I don't seem to be getting anywhere. What can I do?

If you think your pay is wrong, or you haven't been paid for extra hours worked, the best thing you can do is talk to your employer and find out what's going on. If you and your employer can't agree on how much you should have been paid, you can challenge them. You should act quickly though — it'll be harder to get your money after 3 months from the date the problem arose.

You should start by checking your payslip if you've got one. This will help you see how your pay has been worked out. Check things like:

- have you been paid for the number of hours you've actually worked
- If you've been paid at the correct rate
- If you've been paid overtime, a commission or a bonus
- Whether you've been paid any sick pay
- If your employer has deducted any money that you weren't expecting

Ask your employer to explain anything you don't understand on your payslip or why you haven't been paid what you believe you are owed. If you disagree with anything, explain why. If your employer has made a genuine mistake, ask them to pay you the money you're owed straight away – you should not have to wait until your next pay day.

# **Myxomatosis**

The vaccine offers protection against myxomatosis, a highly infectious disease often seen in wild rabbits. The virus is spread by insects such as fleas, mites, and mosquitoes, as well as by rabbit-to-rabbit contact. It can also be spread indirectly through contamination from objects such as bedding, grass, and shoes, meaning that even if your rabbit lives in your house, the disease can still be brought indoors accidentally. Sadly, there is no proven treatment for myxomatosis, and with a high mortality rate, it is very rare for an unvaccinated rabbit to recover.

# **Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease**

The vaccine also helps to protect your rabbit from the two strains of rabbit (viral) haemorrhagic disease, RHD1 and RHD2. Like myxomatosis, both RHD1 and RHD2 are deadly viruses that affect wild and domestic rabbits. RHD1 was first discovered in the UK in 1991. The second strain arrived in 2014. Both strains are highly contagious and can be carried on clothing and other material as well as being spread by insects and contact with infected rabbits. Neither strain of RHD currently has a known cure, meaning the disease is unfortunately fatal for most unvaccinated rabbits which catch it. The Myxo RHD Plus vaccine will offer protection for your rabbit against all three of these severe infectious viruses. It won't guarantee that your rabbit will never catch them, but being fully vaccinated should make their symptoms much milder, giving them a much better chance of making a full recovery.

Rabbits can be vaccinated from as young as five weeks old and should receive booster vaccinations every 6-12 months. If it has been more than a year since your rabbit's last vaccination, arrange an appointment with your vet as soon as possible.
