



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Councils are to install 28 New electric vehicle charge points in their car parks to help tackle climate change. Mid Suffolk car parks due to benefit from the new chargers are all in Stowmarket car parks

Tour of Britain, Thursday 7 September. The UK's biggest professional cycle race, starting and and finishing in Felixstowe, passes through Needham Market and Stowmarket See the Tour of Britain website.

National Grid pylons public consultation was held in July on plans for a new high-voltage power line across East Anglia, including Mid Suffolk and Babergh. The Norwich to Tilbury project has previously been opposed by both councils amid significant concerns, particularly over the impact on the environment. The next consultation webinars ,August 12, 17 (both 10-11am). For more details visit the National Grid website.

Gateway14: plans have been submitted for a 164,500 sq ft manufacturing and warehouse unit on — this new state-of-the-art business, innovation and logistics park in Stowmarket. This is speculative planning permission covering EV charging, solar power, rain water collection and nesting boxes see the MSDC Planning Portal.

Solar Farm application at Bramford. Mid Suffolk District Council and CARE (Community Alliance for a Rural Environment Suffolk) issued a joint statement about this application and appeal. MSDC refused this planning application in February and the applicant appealed to the Planning Inspector. The Council reviewed its position and sought legal advice on 21 June at the newlyformed planning committee's first meeting. While "The committee will always consider and value public opinion alongside the recommendations of professional planning officers in reaching a decision in the best interests of the district. However, this must be in accordance with its statutory duty, in accordance with the local development plan and the National Planning Policy Framework. Taking this into account, the Council will not be defending the reasons for refusal. Community representatives will continue to make their case directly to the inspector. We will continue to lobby Government to provide urgent clarity on energy developments as well as a national plan for agriculture, to help all local authorities find the right balance between food production, protecting our countryside, and delivering energy security. Locality award was agreed as part funding Needham Boxing Club Toilets. **Planning considerations** have included the lack of blister pack recycling, a tree shading a sitting room window, bulldozing access through a hedge, the refurbishment of grade 2 listed building without permission. Mowing grass verges and trimming back footpath hedges. Thanks to previous councillors Mike Norris and Stephen Phillips and Councillor Kay Oaks for funding the speed reduction cameras with locality awards in Needham High Street, which seem to be having an impact.

Anti-social behaviour at Needham Lake. Ross Piper has kept me updated on actions in respect of this an issue particularly the bbq area at weekends and issues at Horsepond Place with Landscaping and repairs to property.

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HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) is reminding parents and carers of teens staying in full-time education or training that they need to let HMRC know to continue receiving Child Benefit payments by 31 August, or their payments will automatically stop.

Opposition to power lines: At MSDC meeting held in Elmswell 19th July a motion with full cross party support re-stated their objection to the proposed Norwich to Tilbury pylon line, and a strong preference for an integrated offshore approach. The Chair of the Council will communicate these objections to the government minister.

REPORT FOR THE THREDLING DIVISION FROM CLLR MATTHEW HICKS Suffolk Fire Service to bring control room back to the County by the end of 2024 creating a new fire control centre in the county which, since October 2011 been shared with Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire and Rescue Service in Huntingdon. The joint project has worked well, saving both fire services money. However, problems and advancements in technology. have led to this decision. The proposed new control centre will be brought to Suffolk County Council's Cabinet for approval in September 2023. Help for Suffolk Pre-payment Meter customers. Warm Homes Suffolk is a Suffolk-wide Council partnership service, delivering energy efficiency support to low-income households. It is supported by Suffolk's Collaborative Communities Board and funding from Public Health Suffolk's Contain Outbreak Management Fund (COM F) The Service can check eligibility and support applications for grants to increase household energy efficiency, with measures such as loft and wall insulation to air source heat pumps, and draught-proofing. Over 24,000 people in Suffolk are on pre-payment meters. The service will do home visits or advise by phone or email. The COMF funding of £180,000 will enable this project to run for 12 months to provide the following: Income maximisation (through grants and benefits); Budgeting advice; Help understanding bills and heating systems; Support to reduce energy expenditure (By promoting social tariffs and support to switch suppliers); Improving household energy efficiency (By installing insulation, draught proofing, heating systems and solar panels); Facilitating switch away from prepaid meters if appropriate. 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£100m broadband investment in Suffolk under the Government's Project Gigabit around 80,000 properties in rural Suffolk. The county is one of three to benefit and was chosen for the launch of the announcement by Minister for Data and Digital Infrastructure, Sir John Whittingdale. Improved connectivity unlocks new opportunities and fuels innovation, This project is managed by BDUK and CityFibre will be installing the cabling. Decisions on where broadband infrastructure is installed will be made by BDUK and not by SCC. First installations will be in the New Year and the first live connections expected by Summer 2024. The broadband network can supporting speeds of up to 10Gbp. Many of Suffolk's small businesses are operated from households across the county, it is essential for the future of the local economy.

Council to consider new chapter for library services The current contract with Suffolk's Libraries Industrial and Provident Society (IPS), ends on 31st July 2024. In May 2023, Suffolk County Council's Cabinet agreed to protect library services by providing IPS an additional £720k per year for increased costs. The Council now needs to consider a new contract. The report to Cabinet recommends that this is procured with public consultation and by competitive tender and that the current contract with Suffolk's Libraries IPS is extended, to 31 May 2025. The new contract will be for 6 years, with the option to extend for a further 6 years. Libraries play a vital role in our local communities – offering more than books; they providing community spaces which bring people of all ages together, to learn, socialise, read and take part in activities. The proposed value of the new contract will be £6.842m per year, with an extral £0.2m for the Libraries Outreach Service.

Cllr Matthew Hicks Annual Report to the Parish Council APM for the Thredling Division

Council to protect adult care and children's services with £47m more funding which accounts for 75% of the whole budget and is needed to meet the huge increase in demand and higher costs due to inflation. This was a result of an online survey of over 2,600 local people asking where they would spend more or less money, and their views on Council Tax.

£500,000 for Highways: to use environmentally friendly weed treatments, and stop using glyphosate which can damage wildlife. £110,000 for tree management: to support the 'right tree right place' policy, having an appropriate inspection regime and supporting the resulting tree management requirements.

£45,000 for Citizens Advice: to support work during cost of living challenges A budget gap for next year - proposals for the Council's budget would increase by 9.6% (from £625.3m to £685.3). Additional funds would come from a total 3.99% increase in Council Tax, and an increase in funds from the Government for adult and children's social care. Regarding Council Tax, the proposed 3.99% increase would be made up of a 1.99% increase in general Council Tax and a 2.00% increase for adult care.

A landmark devolution deal, guaranteed for the next thirty years, puts money and power over building, regeneration and skills, adult education, new affordable homes on brownfield site and to improve energy efficiency in houses. The deal is Suffolk will also get a directly elected leader of the Council providing a single person who is accountable to the people of Suffolk and a local champion who can attract investment and be a stronger voice in discussions with central government. The deal also sets out the government's plans to devolve more power to Suffolk County Council through: Investment: It will bring funding worth £480 million for local priorities.

Housing: The deal will provide £5.8 million to regenerate brownfield land into beautiful, affordable homes and drive economic growth across the area; Suffolk will also receive greater compulsory purchase powers.

Education: the Adult Education Budget to suit the needs of residents and the Suffolk economy.

Transport: An integrated transport settlement starting in 2024/25, to improve key transport infrastructure priorities.

The Environment: so Suffolk can deliver on its ambitions to be the country's greenest county with £3 million to improve energy efficiency in homes. The deal is now subject to local consultation, a council resolution to change their governance model so that electors directly elect the council leader, and elements, such as the transfer of new powers, require parliamentary approval to secondary legislation. The deal envisages the election of a directly elected leader after May 2024. Subject to the passing of the relevant measures in the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill.

£2.5 million saved on energy costs as LED streetlight project - replacing 43,400 streetlights with environmentally-friendly and cost-saving LED bulbs nears completion. It has saved more than £2.5 million pounds so far. This supports

Suffolk County Council's aim to reduce carbon, light pollution, and bring down ongoing maintenance costs with a reduction of 77.64% made to date. All heritage-style lanterns are also being upgraded. The system will allow individual or groups of lights to be dimmed or switched on or off and automatically flag any lights that are not working. It supports SCC's ambition to become a carbonneutral organisation by 2030.

The Council's Cabinet agreed funding for for children and young people with SEND. The £3million agreement marks the start of Phase 3 of the Capital Programme to create three additional specialist units providing 42 additional places for students with special educational needs and disabilities. So far, £45million has been allocated by Suffolk County Council to deliver the new places for Phase 1 and Phase 2 - £15million of which has been provided by the Department for Education. In addition, Cabinet also agreed to support the Department for Education's High Needs Provision Capital Funding (HNPCF) for 2023/24 of £7million for units in main-stream schools creating up to 168 new spaces. Cabinet has also supported the application for funding for two free schools from the Department for Education. One in east Suffolk for children with severe learning difficulties and the second in Sudbury for those with autistic spectrum disorder and complex social, emotional and mental health problems. In total, Suffolk will deliver up to 1,317 new places for children and young people with SEND by 2025/26

£7.8 million redevelopment of Foxhall Recycling Centre to begin

RG Carter Ltd has been appointed as contractor to increase capacity for cars and to meet future growth. The site will have better access to the containers and containers can be emptied without the need to close the site. £794,414 comes from East Suffolk Council through the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). The site will remain open to the public during construction. The Re-use shop will change location and will need to be closed for a period. Of the 11 recycling centres around the County Foxhall accounts for 19% of recycling and waste, collecting more than 12,500 tonnes a years.

County Councils unanimously agree "no" to damaging pylons proposal Authorities in Essex, Norfolk and Suffolk have united to condemn the current proposals for a 180km network of 50m tall electricity pylons. The East Anglia GREEN proposal put forward by National Grid between Norwich, Bramford and Tilbury. The councils agree that the plan for pylons is destructive and outdated, and will cause irreversible damage to the countryside, wildlife habitats and local communities. A new electricity network is needed to transmit the ambitious 50 GW of offshore wind that the Government aims to be delivered by 2030, and to connect new projects like Sizewell C. So much of this ambition falls on East Anglia, to provide energy for much of the country. The councils support the need to generate renewable and low carbon electricity, to meet Net Zero ambitions. However, they believe that more suitable, sustainable and modern alternatives have not been properly investigated, such as undersea cable routes. Formalising their long-standing positions on the East Anglia GREEN proposal, the councils join a group of 13 MPs who signed a letter criticising the consultation, along with a growing public petition

Once Summer gets underway, I enjoy spending much more time in Suffolk and discover afresh all that's great about Central Suffolk and North Ipswich. From the swathes of farmland and open skies to the local produce markets and the vibrant businesses in North Ipswich. The Summer Recess gives me the opportunity to spend all my time at home here in the constituency, something which I particularly value and relish.

The school holidays are also approaching bringing to mind the planning of holidays and activities. I am sure that with the arrival of the school summer holiday period comes a frantic last-minute attempt to draw up plans for childcare and days out, no mean feat when many households may have both parents working and therefore have to share the responsibility of covering childcare. Thank goodness for the goodwill of grandparents or other family members and friends.

We are fortunate in Suffolk as we benefit from a wide array of free and low-cost activities. Suffolk has a splendid blend of coastline, encompassing the natural beauty of Thorpeness and Dunwich as well as busy piers at Southwold and Felixstowe. Suffolk also boasts some beautiful river walks, something I was recently reminded of when I opened a brand-new footbridge for the River Gipping Trust. There are lots of village fetes, special practical activities at our libraries, nature reserves and museums and park activities for all.

The People and Nature survey carried out by Natural England demonstrated the positive role of nature in supporting children's well-being, with eight in ten of children interviewed agreeing that being in nature made them very happy. Children who reported spending more time outside (and more time noticing nature and wildlife) were more likely to report that, 'being in nature makes me very happy' compared to those who had spent less time. We are incredibly spoilt here in Suffolk with a beautiful natural environment, right here on our doorstep and just waiting to be discovered.

Local parks and private gardens are important ways of accessing green and natural spaces and with many ways to find something to appeal to all. There are things which bring to mind the simple pleasures of growing up and letting your imagination run wild, building dens, getting the paddling pool out, having picnics outdoors or creating homes for nature, all of which can be done from the back garden.

From the Rectory

Rev. Philip Payne The soil in which we grow

As this goes to print it will be harvest time. Over recent weeks I have seen the surrounding fields turning from green to golden brown. Behind the Rectory, harvesters will soon be at work. Then, only bare earth will remain until the cycle begins once more. The land is fertile, yet here in our garden, all attempts to grow vegetables have failed. Unless in pots or grow bags, our seeds succumb to birds, drought and weeds. The same land - radically different results.

Overlooking the adjoining fields, as time passes we are treated to a sort of stop-gap view of the farming year. Soon we will see the harvester at work, headlights blazing long into the night. Then, as the seasons pass, we will witness a range of activities; the ground prepared, seeds sown, fertiliser and water applied when required; a never-ending round.

The well-known harvest hymn may say we plough the fields and scatter the good seed ... but it is fed and watered by God, but there is more to it than that. God's contribution is vital, but so is the human; and it is never-ending. The land around us yields as it does because generations of farmers have worked it, cared for it and continue to do so. It's an ongoing commitment. The contrast with the Rectory garden is immediate. It could bear fruit, but it would need more time and effort than we are prepared to give. The garden is a place of recreation for us and vital food and shelter to wildlife. I rely on others for my daily bread.

Watching the harvest ripening in the field I reflect that here is an image of society as a whole; the soil in which we all grow. Our health, our well-being, ultimately our very existence; all depend not only on this year's crop, but also on the well-being of the society in which we live. As the health of the farm land depends on generations of diligent labour, so too does the health of our society, it doesn't just happen, we all have a part to play. As the harvest is gathered in and the bare earth appears once more, I ponder: what will be my part in the year ahead; and what is yours?

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride 9th September, 2023

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust celebrates fifty years of raising funds to help preserve Suffolk's magnificent churches. Over £10m has been raised by the Trust and the annual sponsored bike ride (which also now incorporates walking, travelling by vintage vehicle, etc) has played a principal part, which has been copied nationally.

I have been participating in this effort for about 20 years. In recent times, since I took over Nigel Smart's long list, up to £1,000 has been contributed each year by donors in and around the Village, half going to SHCT, the other to St Mary's Church. There are two planting days planned on Saturday 7th October and Sunday 15th October.



A BIT OF HISTORY

Creeting Witches – Who Was the Second Alleged Witch in 1645? (Continued from May/June '23)

In the last newsletter I told the tale of the alleged witch Ann Hamer, hung for her confession of sleeping with the Devil. She was one of two alleged witches being tried in 1645 for witchcraft according to John Stearne, an associate of the self-styled Matthew Hopkins, the "Witchfinder General". The details of Ann Hammer's demise was from the same record as the second miscreant's which I found at Ipswich Records Office. So, who was this other unfortunate person? He was Nicholas Hempstead.

The text that follows is taken from, as far as I'm aware, a direct transcription of what John Stearne wrote in his prosecution notes. You may find it difficult to follow. One can only assume this a typical prosecution at the time.

Nicholas Hempstead of Creeting in Suffolk, being found upon exhortations, and laying the heinousness of the sin, and God's Judgements, and Gods mercy and the like, notwithstanding he at first railed on me in very opprobrious terms, yet presently sent for me, and would have asked for forgiveness, he presently confessed that he had made a league and Covenant with the Devil, and how he had confirmed it with his blood; And the shape of his Imps and of the Devil when they covenanted, and how he killed a horse of one of the constables, because he pressed him for a soldier, and five of the best in Colonel Rochesters Troop; And divers other things he had done making a large confession, with a great deal of penitence and sorrow, which he so continued with (as I once heard) to his very execution without alteration.)

Nicholas Hempstead was hanged in 1645 at Bury St Edmunds on 27 th August. The day after Ann Hamer.

Footnote:

Eventually, there was a question of the validity of the witch-finder's claims, which were coming under increasing scrutiny. In light of newly emerging (and more tolerant) ways of thinking, both the veracity and the beliefs surrounding the prosecution of witches were coming under question. In the face of increasing opposition, both Hopkins and Stearne defended their methods. They claimed that methods such as sleep deprivation, enforced marching and intense psychological pressure were required to break the will of a witch. These explanations were widely dismissed in the face of growing judicial opposition, and in Norfolk both men were charged with utilization of undue torture and pandering to the court. These charges prompted hasty retirements for both men, and Hopkins returned to Manningtree in August 1646. Less than a year later, Hopkins was dead from an apparent bout of tuberculosis. By the time of his death, Hopkins had been at the heart of the bloodiest chapter in the history of witchcraft in England.



Suffolk Tree Warden Network (STWN)

WILDLIFE SIGHTINGS

Tell us about your interesting encounters with wildlife - not just birds perhaps. Ed.

The big issue of our times?

The subject of this article is a matter not even thought of when I was young, much disputed for many years, controversial even now and rarely discussed. You might think it would be BREXIT, Instead, the subject is climate change. Some deny it is happening, including a few prominent politicians, others think it may be happening but it is not important. Some see it but feel powerless to make a difference, and a minority, are taking personal action. Is there evidence? There is a lot. Emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases are the cause. Climate scientists have tracked gases in the atmosphere over millennia by analysis of gas particles in Antarctic ice. Emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases are rising.

Can we sense the reality? We could take the view that our climate varies from year to year and always has done. However, it is easy to find evidence to show the long term trend in temperatures is strongly and dangerously upward. See NASA (https://climate.nasa.gov/vital-signs/global-temperature/) for the global picture over 100 years.

Nearer to home, Nicholas Watts a Lincolnshire farmer, has been keeping detailed weather records and recently shared concerning data. His farm's 50 year average temperature for June is 15.05 degrees centigrade. This June, the average was 16.2 degrees. The hottest Junes have all occured in the last 20 years. The average temperature for his farm has risen near to 10% - a very major change.

Why is this happening? First: people, particularly in advanced economies are the cause. In 1950 there were 2,500,000,000 people on the earth it is now 8,000,000,000, and rising—meaning more use of oil, coal etc. Second, more cars, heating and cooling houses and travelling further for holidays—perhaps Majorca rather than Blackpool. Third, huge areas of natural forest and peatland which once stored carbon have been replaced with commercial forestry and agriculture, releasing carbon instead. The hotter and drier climate is making massive wild fires common releasing huge amounts of carbon. The heat is melting ice at the poles and glaciers on mountains at an alarming rate.

Action is being taken to generate power through wind turbines and solar panels rather than burning of coal, oil or gas. Politicians have met regularly to agree action plans to cut emissions, notable in Kyoto and Paris. These have not been met and greenhouse gases are still rising. What will be the consequences be for us, our children and grand-children and for the natural world of a hotter climate? Scientists advise that there are already serious problems which will get much worse quickly if action is not taken at country and at individual level. Events today in the USA, southern Europe and Korea seem just a sample of what is to come. We can all do more but, to make a big change, governments must do much more. One thing you can do is to ensure politicians know our concerns.

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

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

Citizens' Advice Mid Suffolk

Each issue we print a contribution from this charity but my recent experience showed me that this free advice service does work. I became worried after 3 phone calls informing me that money had been taken from my bank account fraudulently. I could not find a person to speak to at my bank so called CA. I left a message as requested and within 3hours my call was returned. As I was not at home to take it another call was promised after the weekend, and sure enough I did then speak to an adviser who took my concerns seriously, but reassured me it a scam and have me advice on how to deal with such things in future.

It sounds so simple but I found it most helpful to speak to a human rather than fight through online communication.

My oldest child is starting school in September and with uniforms and PE kits, the costs are already mounting. We're already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these new costs. Is there any extra help I can get?

The start of a school year can be tough for many people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries. But there is help available.

On the National Citizens Advice website:

citizensadvice.org.uk/family/education/help-with-school-costs there is information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs.

If you're claiming benefits you may get extra help for things like school lunches, transport and uniforms. If you are not online, Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can advise on the telephone or in person.

Children in Reception and Years 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. For older children, you can apply for free school meals if you claim certain types of benefits. The full list is available on the Citizens Advice website, and includes Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support.

Schools can advise on finding cheap or free second hand uniforms. Often the school will have a second hand uniform shop, where the cost is much cheaper. A lot of schools accept cheaper non-logo items rather than official school uniform, so do check with your school if this is the case.

If your child is disabled or has a health condition, you can also claim Disability Living Allowance (this isn't means-tested). A lot of peoples' budgets are feeling the squeeze at the moment, buthelp is available with starting school costs.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can advise on many issues issues: such as debt, employment, benefits and family law.

How does the new cat microchipping law affect you?

It's heartbreaking when a beloved family pet goes missing, and searching for them can be stressful and daunting. While some cats are found, sadly not all lost cats are returned home. However, a new law aims to reunite more lost cats with their families.

What is the law?

The new law makes microchipping mandatory for owned cats above 20 weeks old. Cats must be microchipped by 10 June 2024, and owners who have not microchipped their cat will have 21 days to get their cat microchipped, or face a fine of up to £500.

What is microchipping?

Microchipping is a simple procedure in which a chip, smaller than a grain of rice, is implanted between your cat's shoulders. The chip has a code which, when scanned, provides veterinary practices or animal shelters with the owner's contact details from the microchip database. The procedure is quick, painless, and should feel no different to having a booster jab. The chip won't cause them discomfort or pain and they are unlikely to know it's there. Microchips are not linked to GPS, and do not track your cat's location.

Why is microchipping important?


Microchipping your cat is the most efficient way of ensuring that, should your cat become lost or stolen, pet authorities can return them home. Earlier this year Battersea released data showing that 59 per cent of cats that were brought into their shelter were not microchipped, which meant that cats were three times less likely to be returned home than dogs.

It's important that both outdoor and indoor cats are chipped as, if they escape, indoor cats can be particularly confused when outside. Collars and ID tags are no substitute for microchipping, as they can fall off or be removed.

How can you get your cat microchipped?

All veterinary practices offer microchipping and, rather than waiting for the deadline, it is best to microchip your cat and register your contact details as soon as possible.
