Speed Data

The data from our two Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) is collected approximately every two months and the data fed into a chart. The below charts show the speeds between 2nd November 2022 to 6th January 2023.

Speeding / Poor Driving – All Saints Road



Many incidents of speeding during school pickup and school drop off times have been reported to the Parish Council along with reports of dangerous driving whilst parents are walking along All Saints Road with their young children. Could all motorists please be mindful of pedestrians when driving along All Saints Road during these times. Please drive slowly and give the parents and children plenty of room to walk. Thank you.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CiL) Money

CiL money is money collected by the District Council from property developers once they start a new build in the village. 15% of that money is passed to the Parish Council to spend on infrastructure in the village. This could be play areas, footpaths/pathways, Village Halls etc etc. Some residents have asked if the Parish Council had received any CiL money from the 52 houses currently being built on the Breheny site. Unfortunately, no it did not. That is because CiL was adopted by the District Council in April 2016 and the Breheny development was granted planning permission in 2015. When it comes to CiL collection, planning permissions and any variations on that permission that are granted before April 2016 would not have a CiL liability attached to them. The approved development of up to 43 houses on Jacks Green Road is likely to give the village £75,000 - £125,000 of CiL money, which is obviously a substantial amount. The Parish Council therefore would be interested in hearing any suggestions on what to use the CiL money for in the village. 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Report for the Thredling Division from Cllr Matthew Hicks

Council to protect frontline services and increase funding in budget proposal Adult care services and children's services will receive £47m more funding as part of Suffolk County Council's £685m budget proposals, published in December. Adult care services will have £34m more in their budget, and children's services will have a further £13m to meet the huge increase in demands for services, and higher costs. An online survey and focus groups, asking how to spend council money, and their views on Council Tax and these were social care services for adults and children. The final budget will be voted on at Full Council on 9 February.

Historic half a billion-pound devolution deal hands Suffolk powers to level up Suffolk will be devolved power over their Adult Education budget, new affordable homes on brownfield sites, and improving energy efficiency in houses with over a £480 million investment fund guarenteed for thirty years. Suffolk will also get a directly elected leader of the Council, providing single person accountable to the people of Suffolk and a stronger voice in discussions with central government. 50% of England has devolution deals and reaffirms the government's commitment in the Levelling Up White Paper. Further government's plans are to devolve more power to SCC through investment in local priorities, housing, transport, education and the environment that best suits the needs of residents and the local economy. This will help Suffolk in its ambition to be the country's greenest county with £3 million to improve energy efficiency in homes.

Keeping people in Suffolk warm this winter

"Suffolk Winter Warmth" provides items such as clothing bedding, hot water bottles, LED bulbs, draughtproofing and more, to households in need. Residents can be referred by professional or voluntary sector organisations. The project is backed by £50,000 of funding from Suffolk's Collaborative Communities Board through East Suffolk Counci. Reports for the Annual Parish Meeting May 2022 Blacksmith's Field annual Report

The entrance to the field from All Saints Road has been greatly improved with the installation of a footpath which ends by the play equipment, making it accessible even during the wet winter months. The new play equipment has proved very popular and families are coming from outside the village to enjoy the facilities. A few repairs were needed on some areas of the play equipment which were carried out by Andy Pallant and Ray Palmer. The play bark also needs to be topped up and I hope to organise this early June.

Phil Piper organised the replacement of the goal posts with movable posts, making the pitch more user friendly. Again this has proved very popular. The pathway cut through the wild meadow ending by the pond allows you to get closer to the wild flowers and Pyramid orchids were spotted last year. Unfortunately a number of dog owners are not clearing up after their dog and it was agreed at the last Parish Council meeting to ask residents if they would like to see a fence installed around the play area to keep dogs out.

Litter has become a problem around the picnic benches and on the field. The Parish Council have installed a litter bin at the entrance to the field for people to use, or take the litter home.

There are various bird boxes around the field. Unfortunately two owl boxes came down in the strong winds. One is irreparable but the other is being repaired by William Barnes and will be put back later this year.

The den building equipment has been replaced, but is being moved outside of the designated area and causes problems when the field is cut. Parents are asked to help their children to put it back, so others can enjoy it too.

The firework night was a great success.

To commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee the Parish Council have planted a Whitebeam tree near to the entrance of the field. The Social Club will be opening on the 2 June and will light the beacon in line with other towns and villages throughout the country.

Annual Report Creeting St Mary CEVAP School

Creeting St Mary CEVAP is providing a primary education for the children of Creeting St Mary and the surrounding area that is built around Christian values where everyone is welcomed, respected and encouraged to use their God-given gifts.

We currently have 97 children enrolled at the school. Each year has an intake of up to 15 children and after the reception year the children are taught in classes with 2 year groups.

Our Head teacher, Mrs Friar has now been in her role for 5 years and we have a strong team of experienced teachers with extremely low turnover. This year has seen us slowly return to "normal" following COVID. Our school provided its children with education throughout the pandemic either in the

school or with remote educational material. The staff worked tirelessly, to support our children, often whilst feeling anxious about their own health or concerned about their own family members, to provide the children with a safe environment in which to learn. This year they have focussed on supporting the children to catch up on work they have missed, supporting the children with their mental health and finding opportunities for the children to enjoy the wider educational experiences.

In October 2021 the school celebrated it's 150th Anniversary. The day was marked with a Victorian themed day – the children and staff dressed in Victorian costumes and had a taste of a Victorian style education. In February 2022 we were inspected by Ofsted who rated us as Good. The inspectors found our children to be polite and articulate and off the record stated that they thought they were delightful. The team works extremely hard to ensure that every child at

Thanks to a generous donation from local company – Cranes - we have installed a pavilion on the school field. This has provided the children with a fabulous outside working space and a great place to play at break time. The children and their families have supported the Stowmarket Food Bank throughout the year with generous donations at Harvest, Christmas and Easter.

The school community delighted to be able to attend services in the Church again and to welcome family and friends back into the school grounds for functions like the Summer Fayre on 18th June.

In the first instance, I hope you all had a very happy and peaceful festive season and my best wishes to you for the New Year ahead.

We all want to ensure that our children and grandchildren have good homes to live in. We also recognise the need for new housing developments where there is a need, and to ensure that there are affordable new homes, including social rented houses in larger new developments. However, decisions should be taken locally, and brownfield development should be prioritised ahead of building on the countryside.

It is these principles that now underpin our planning laws. When I was first elected as an MP in 2010, the Government introduced the Localism Act to support local councils to develop evidence-based housing plans according to local housing need. Suffolk's towns and parishes now also have the power to develop their own neighbourhood plans. Thanks to these important Government reforms, Whitehall civil servants, many of whom have never set foot in Suffolk, lost the power to impose massive new housing developments. It is because of my belief in protecting the countryside from overdevelopment, and letting councils take the lead in developing evidence-based housing growth plans based upon local need, that I recently worked with other MPs to block suggested changes to the planning system which would have potentially reintroduced a form of regionally set housing target by the back door, as well as fast-tracked developments in certain areas without proper local consultation or scrutiny. We must continue to better protect local consultation and decision making in the planning process. I am currently fighting to ensure that new laws are introduced to allow a community right of appeal against a planning decision. Currently, developers have the right to appeal but communities do not. Bad planning decisions need

Over the past few years, there have been developments recommended and granted for approval because of the fear of the cost to the council of defending an appeal. Creating a new community right of appeal would support council planning officers and councillors to make decisions which are in the best interests of the local community.

to be challenged, and residents deserve the right to do so.

I shall continue to do all that I can to ensure our local councils have all the tools they need to make the right planning decisions in the future.



From the Rectory

Rev. Philip Payne **Service**

Recently, Mary and I enjoyed a visit to the Imperial War Museum at Duxford. The museum's collection of aircraft is impressive; from brightly coloured, frail looking, wood and fabric examples from the first world war down to some sinister looking camouflaged giants of the late 20th century. The focus, as the name suggests, is on military aviation, though there were some interesting civil aircraft as well. Did you know that in the early post-war years, cabin crew on the old Empire air routes were trained hairdressers?

Like all good museums, the displays don't just rely on the machinery to tell the story. Alongside the aircraft, were the stories of the men and women who operated them and supported them. After all, however impressive, an aircraft is just an inanimate object until brought to life by the men and women who build, maintain and operate it. The story of aviation is, first and foremost, the story of aviators.

Aviation has come a long way in just over a century. Walking round the exhibition halls I wondered at the courage and ingenuity of the early pioneers; and not just in war-time. Today we take safe, comfortable air-travel for granted. We forget, or never knew, the dangers the pioneers faced, nor

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how much work goes on to maintain our comfort and safety.

Driving home, I reflected that what is true of aviation is true of all areas of life. The current costof-living-crisis, for example, demonstrates how much we take for granted; from clean water or electrical power at the flick of a switch – to comfortable housing and a full stomach. We all owe our comfort and safety to the hard work and often sacrificial service of many people, most of whom we will never meet. I don't make new-year resolutions but as we enter this new year, I am resolved to be more aware of and grateful for their labours.



A BIT OF HISTORY

Jack's Green, Creeting St Mary

I'm sure many of you are familiar with the area in Creeting St Mary known as Jack's Green. Before the 1960s, there were just a few homes until many bungalows were built to form the majority of the current housing in Jack's Green. However, well before these bungalows were built there were just a few homes in what we know as Jack's Green. Close to the junction with Flordon Road and St Mary's Gardens stood a handful of small semi-detached cottages, all of which have been converted to larger dwellings. At the other end of Jack's Green Road, going north, there were five quite small cottages forming the original Almshouses. Some time ago they were converted to a large single dwelling. Continuing over the adjacent ford (now piped under the road) and turning left into St Mary's Road were a pair of semi-detached cottages on the right-hand side, Jubilee cottages dated 1887, which are still two properties. A short distance on the same side is St Mary's Cottages, now one property. Further down the road is a building which is actually two

properties, numbers 28 and 30. You may have noticed, number 30 has the sign "Sunnyside" outside. Further down St Mary's Road on the right-hand side is Black Water Hall, currently being updated. All of these older properties have been standing for some time but in addition to the these, two pairs of semi-detached Council houses were built in 1933, two in St Marv's Road and two in Jack's Green Road. They were constructed so the back gardens were end-to-end with each other, that is, with each garden lining up with the one in the next road. One of these has had alterations but the other three are as built with the exception comparativly minor changes. Part way along Jack's Green Road on the A14 side is a field forming a rough triangle that you might have noticed. Its Easterly edge runs alongside the main A14 road, its Southerly edge meets with All Saints Road behind the trees and its Northern edge is bounded by an open drainage ditch beyond which is open grass area. You may have noticed that in this field there has recently been some small-scale excavation activity. I understand that this is normal for land which is ear-marked for building houses on thus it is subject to archeological exploration. I gather that nothing of archeological interest



was discovered but in spite of valid objections by many of the local residents, planning permission was still approved to go ahead with the construction of 43 dwellings on this field.

Our year was rounded off by a lunch out in early December. before we got stuck into our own Christmas festivities.



For our first meeting in January we were back in the Village Hall for a talk about Energy from waste - a dull topic you may think, but not when your speaker is Siobhan from the Great Blakenham facility! She showed us first, a Birds Eye Peas plastic packet which had been retrieved from Landfill and had not degraded at all in 50 years - it may well look just the same in 100 or 200 years. A sobering thought...... Our waste, in the Ipswich area, is all burned at Great Blakenham to a very high standard of safety and efficiency. This in fact produces enough electricity for 40,000 homes, and even the ash is used for such things as road building and breeze blocks for building. The steam you may notice coming from their chimney is closely monitored for 8 possible pollutants. (if any were found it would be shut down to find a cause.) Ideally future waste would consist of things we could recycle, and packaging and the substances used are gradually moving in that direction, something the Government is paying close attention to currently. It's possible to book a visit to the site, children are welcome and our speaker Siobhan is usually the guide.

We welcomed two prospective new members to this meeting.

You are very welcome to join us at 7.30 on Wed Feb 8th. to view some Home Movies of times past in our WI when we had annual Christmas theatrical productions, some well known and loved members will be recognised I'm sure!

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

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As the weather has turned colder, I've noticed mould and damp in our flat. It's mainly in our bedroom, including some black mould on the carpet. I've been chasing our letting agency, who say they'll speak to our landlord. I'm really worried about how this might affect our health. Our tenancy agreement isn't up for eight months, what can I do?

It's good that you've already raised the issue with your letting agency. Unfortunately, it isn't always easy to work out the cause of mould or damp This can make it difficult to work out if your landlord is responsible, unless there's an obvious cause, like a leaking roof.

There are many causes of damp. The most common are rising, penetrating, construction and condensation damp. To prevent condensation, it's important to keep homes well-heated and well-ventilated, but for a lot of people this will be trickier in the colder weather with higher heating costs. You may be eligible for help to insulate and heat your home, and should visit our website to find out more.

On our website there is also information to work out the type of damp, who is responsible and what you can do. We also have advice on things that can make damp worse and may impact the landlord taking responsibility for repairs. These include drying clothes on heaters or blocking air vents. Check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp.

A landlord will have to act in relation to damp if it makes the property unsafe to live in such as making the tenant ill. The landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like broken heaters. If the damp has damaged items that the landlord is responsible for, such as carpets and window frames, they should cover the cost of repairs. If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your property but doesn't act, you can report them to the local authority. If you're in social housing you might also be able to use the landlord's formal complaints procedure. If it reaches the point where you want to get out of a fixed term tenancy agreement early, speak to Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk first, as there might be better ways to approach the issue.

What should you consider when choosing a veterinary practice?

Firstly ensure that your veterinary surgeon is RCVS registered. You can check if your veterinary surgeon is registered on the RCVS website.

You will want to be able to get to your veterinary practice quickly if your pet ever has an emergency, so how far the practice is from your house? Is it's on public transport links; have a car park or is there public parking nearby.

If you have friends with pets, you could always ask them where they take their pets, and which practice they would recommend. It would be useful to ask people who have the same type of animal as you, as different animals have different care requirements.

For exotic or unusual pets, you need to make sure that there's a veterinary surgeon who has experience dealing with that species. You can enquire with local practices to see whether they can take your pet on, or use the RCVS website to search by species.


The cost of veterinary treatment can vary between practices depending on location and facilities. If you enquire, staff should be able to tell you typical costs for routine treatments. You can also find out what payment plans and 'health club' subscriptions the practice offers.

Some veterinary practices are independent, while others are owned by corporate groups. There should not be any difference in the standard of care between the two types, but some owners may prefer the typically smaller and community-feel of independent practice.

When choosing a practice, you should also see what day-to-day life is like in the practice. When you first visit the practice, things you should look for include clean and well-maintained premises, enough waiting room space and a pet-friendly environment, making the process as least stressful as possible. The practice should have enough consulting areas, and you should feel comfortable approaching staff. If you are allowed to be shown round by staff at a convenient time for them, you should also check that the impatient wards are clean and comfortable.

Ultimately, the most important thing is that the veterinary practice is qualified, and that you feel like you can trust them with your pet.


